

Hi everyone,

Mickleham Parish agazine

I was privileged to go to Peru recently and enjoyed the wonderful scenery, the wildlife (particularly the birds) and the welcome of the people. We were able to visit several Inca sites, including the citadel of Machu Picchu, which gave fascinating insights into Inca life and culture. The Inca Empire was fairly short-lived in the 15th and early 16th centuries and much evidence of it was destroyed by Spanish invaders but the marvel of Machu Picchu in particular remains.

The Incas worshipped gods associated with nature such as the sun, mountains and water. The buildings were constructed to honour these in one way or another. Sometimes they were aligned with the sun's position at the summer or winter solstice. They were often built incorporating the outcrops of the mountain. This was a reminder to me to honour God, keep my focus on Jesus and allow him to guide how I live.

I was also fascinated by the careful construction of the buildings, particularly the temples and houses of important officials. The large stone blocks were hand carved to fit perfectly with those around, which was an amazing feat of ancient engineering by a people who never discovered the wheel or gunpowder. The stonemasons must have been both skilled and patient. The gaps were so tiny that someone remarked 'You couldn't get a knife blade between the stones'. I gathered from our guide that the design was also such that the various stones would move together in an earthquake and so not fall apart.

Thinking about those skilfully constructed walls led me to think about community. Each of us is like a carefully crafted stone and together we form a strong community, which resists being shaken by external forces. It has been shocking to learn of a fatal attack on a synagogue recently for we all belong together, even when we don't feel a good fit. There has to be room for all. We will have differing opinions about politics, religion, music, sport and more. We come from diverse backgrounds and are at various stages of life. Difference need not divide but can enhance and strengthen community as we learn from each other. We are not held together by a thin veneer of outward unity, but by our actions, which express our common values like respect, tolerance, equality, compassion, integrity and justice. These come from our Christian heritage and reveal God's desire for us to live together well. I hope you feel you belong to the community of Mickleham and Westhumble, a bit like being part of the walls of Machu Picchu.

There several significant dates coming up in November. Christmas Shoeboxes for Ukraine and Eastern Europe can be brought to church from 2nd to 9th and RGS-Surrey Hills are kindly organising their collection and ask that boxes are brought to their reception by 17th (see page 17 for the link). Remembrance Sunday is on 9th, giving an opportunity to remember those who sacrificed so much in wars and to pray for peace. Lights to Remember is on 16th, where we recall our loved ones who are no longer with us. Our last autumn lunch is on 20th and 30th is Advent Sunday (details in the calendar). Do join us!

Green Energy in the Church Eco-Group Progress Report

As you may know, the church has been quietly progressing an improvement in its carbon footprint. You may recall that we have had a full, independent review of the church and chapel, and we are in the process of acting on those recommendations.

The chapel heating has been replaced with an overhead, instant space-heating, electric system, which will mean that heating can be instantly effective when switched on. This saves energy and provides 'targeted heat'.

Good progress is being made with the replacement of the church lighting with LEDs. The north aisle lamps were replaced a while ago and this seems to have gone well. However, some of the changes are not as simple and there may be a need for new transformers as well as the lamps themselves... all in progress. We hope to report more fully over the next few months.

The church heating continues to rely on our gas boiler, which still has some years

of life in it. Church of England (CoE) advice is that the sensible approach is to retain the existing system but have in place a plan for an alternative system for when change is appropriate. St Michael's Eco-Group is working on this, although technology is changing very quickly and any plan will need to be continually reviewed based on emerging guidance.

The cost and payback period, for a limited solar panel system, is under evaluation. There are numerous hoops to go through here, not least the listed building aspect. Limitations imposed by such considerations and matters such as battery storage may be deciding factors on viability.

The church has, however, fully changed its gas and energy suppliers to green tariffs. Both are now supplied through Crown Energy. The gas is 100% biogas, which is gas provided via methane etc, from the degradation of organic waste including anaerobic systems on farms.

The electricity is 100% from renewable sources (wind/solar) and from UK facilities. It transpires that the cost is no greater than our past non-green supplier. This is an excellent improvement, which knocks our carbon footprint back to near zero, and puts us in a good place to go for our objective of a Gold Award under the Church Eco-Award Scheme. We have achieved Silver, and energy was one of the key elements on which we were not awarded Gold.

Suppliers are discussed in more detail in the Eco-Group article on page 3 of the June issue (available online if you have discarded your copy). Other green options are continually becoming available, so do look at current reviews when deciding. When choosing a green supplier, ask whether your electricity is generated from UK renewable sources, and whether your gas is 100% biogas. Also check if any 'offsetting' is involved. If there is, ask for verification that such schemes are legitimate. Mark Day



Refurbishment of Church Clock and Weathervane



The church clock mechanism was fully automated in 2024 and at that time we started to look at the condition of the clock face and weathervane. The last time these were refurbished was more than 20 years ago and their condition had deteriorated considerably. They looked okay at a distance but not close up.











We had a window between weddings taking place on 25th July and 27th September to get any work done. In the

event this was barely enough time. Scaffolding was erected at the beginning of August. The plan was for both the clock dial and weathervane to be removed and taken away for restoration by clockmaker, Smith of Derby. This was to include painting the clock face, gilding the numerals and clock hands and cleaning and gilding the weathervane. The opportunity would also be taken to fully service the clock mechanism. The work was designed to bring the clock, clock face and weathervane to a standard which will last for the next 20 to 30 years.

The last time there was work on the church tower was in 2003. The steeple had suffered storm damage and had to be completely retiled. The weathervane and clock face were regilded at the same time. The contrast between the way of working then (shown in the photograph of a newspaper article of the time) and now is quite striking.

The original intention was to remove the clock face along with the weathervane and take them both away. However, sometime in the past the clock face had been cemented in and as a result that piece of the work had to be done in situ. The clock hands were removed, the clock face sanded back





to bare metal and then repainted. At the beginning of September, the refurbished weathervane was returned and reinstalled. In the middle of the month the clock numerals were painted and gilded with gold leaf, the hands re-attached and the clock mechanism reset. The scaffolding was brought down during the third week in September


and the site cleared as visitors were starting to arrive for Heritage Day on 20th September and just a week ahead of the wedding on 27th September.

The result of all that work is quite a change from where we started at the beginning of August.

Mickleham and Westhumble Local History Group Exhibition

Where is it?

As this year's HOD theme was 'Architecture', the local history group mounted an exhibition featuring notable local structures. There was a quiz to go with the exhibition with 20 snapshots of various architectural features associated with the chosen sites. The display in the church featured information and photographs from our archives and additional research.

In addition to printing the answers (see page 28) we plan to include a series of articles about our chosen sites in the parish magazine. Starting with this one:





Leladene Arch Chapel Lane, Westhumble

Victor Freeman, a wealthy American businessman bought the title 'Lord of the Manor' when he aguired the Camilla Lacey Estate in 1922. Soon after their arrival in Westhumble, his wife Lela died. In her memory he renamed the estate 'Leladene' and erected the arch across the road leading to the house. The road is now known as Camilla Drive.

The arch has the initials VF (Victor Freeman) carved on either side. It is constructed from Bath stone, flint and brick. Obviously, Bath stone is not local so it would have been an expensive material to transport. The individual stones are the full width of the sides of the arch which gives it tremendous weight and strength.

Each of the four dog heads would take approximately one week to carve, which gives an idea of how long the original construction of the arch would have taken, and just what an expensive undertaking it would have been. There are owls carved as part of the tops of the uprights on the hinge ends of the wooden gates, they are not separate pieces. The gates no longer close because the level of the road has risen as a result of intermittent resurfacing.





My mum and dad moved to Westhumble 22 years ago and dad rapidly fell in love with all the area had to offer. Then three years later I came along, and we have lived here ever since. Mickleham & Westhumble Local History Group Behind the Scenes at Polesden Lacey

At the end of September, twenty-four members of our group arrived at Polesden, not entirely sure what we were going to see. We split into two smaller groups due to space constraints inside the house and were given a brief introduction by our guides. As many readers will know, Polesden was the weekend home of the society hostess, Margaret 'Maggie' Greville. She was the illegitimate daughter of William McEwan who founded McEwan's brewery and was a self-made millionaire.

In 1891 Maggie married Ronald 'Ronnie' Greville, a Captain in the Lifeguards and later MP for East Bradford. He was also the heir to a baronetcy and a member of the future King Edward VII's Marlborough House set. Maggie brought money to the marriage, and in return Ronnie's connections gave her an entrance into society. Fifteen years later, McEwan bought Polesden for the couple and they embarked on an ambitious project to renovate the house using the architects who had remodelled the Ritz Hotel in London. Maggie wanted 'a room I can entertain Maharajas in' and the opulent gold saloon certainly fulfilled her wish. Sadly, the Grevilles had

only a brief time to enjoy life together in their new home as Ronnie died from pneumonia in April 1908, aged fortythree, following cancer surgery.

Upstairs in the house we had a tour of Maggie's private apartment, a section of the house not normally open to the public. The rooms have spectacular views across the surrounding countryside, and the bedroom has an ensuite bathroom with a marble bath, washbasins and tiles. In its heyday the house had sixteen bedrooms with ensuite bathrooms. Next door to the bedroom is the boudoir, which originally had dark wood panelling on the walls, a brown carpet and yellow curtains, not a colour combination you are likely to see today.

In 1960 the apartment was damaged by fire, after which the room was painted white. A specialist conservator has been leading a team of volunteers to strip back the paint from the panelling, which is being stained to restore the original dark colour. The plaster ceiling was created from moulds used for the Jacobean ceiling seen by Maggie at what is now Ye Olde Reine Deer Inn in Banbury.

In the corridor next to the boudoir we were surprised to see an Otis lift, installed in 1917 to take Maggie to and from her study on the ground floor below. Further along the corridor is a room designed for Ronnie, possibly a dressing room, with a marble washbasin. Also nearby is the King's Suite, designed for Edward VII who was a frequent visitor to Polesden.

Maggie died at the Dorchester Hotel in 1942 and left Polesden to the National Trust. This was a surprise to the Royal Family who had expected the property to be left to them. However, Maggie left more than sixty pieces of her jewellery to the Queen (later Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother), several of which are still worn at royal events.

Village Life in the Fifties: a Chance Encounter

Meridel Holland is an independent researcher, having published most recently on Emily Brontë, John Ruskin and Robert Curzon with a prior interest in Byzantine historiography and literature. Her unusual first name comes from a book read by her mother. After attending St Michael's School, she went to Epsom Grammar then read English at Cambridge and completed a PhD in English at Harvard. As she says, St Michael's clearly gave her an excellent start in life. She lives in Suffolk but on a visit to her childhood haunts, she bumped into Barbara Jones, got chatting and was persuaded to write the following description of village life in the 50s.

Achance encounter with Barbara Jones, who was collecting botanical specimens from a roadside verge, led to this invitation to jot down a few memories of my Mickleham childhood. My family lived in Mickleham in the early 1950s. My school was Mickleham C of E Primary School, my church was St Michael's, and the hills, fields and beech woods all around were my playground.

School was a delight. The headmaster then was Mr Webb, and the teachers were Miss Strudwick, Miss James and Mr Hand. There were only four classes, for children aged between 5 and 11, and going up a class depended on academic prowess, not age. Pupils were drawn from the Roof of the World site on Box Hill and the surrounding countryside, from where we were ferried back and forth by a school bus. Our family lived in a cottage belonging to Warren Farm and that journey was a most blissful part of the day, though I adored school as well. The teachers were kind and would join in hopscotch and snowball fights. Lessons were free ranging, about local history and nature as well as the 3 Rs; there were nature walks, and a vegetable patch where the boys dug while the girls learnt sewing. We all had our midday dinner in Mickleham Village Hall, walking past the Rec, where the annual Bonfire Night was held, past the oak trees (still there) and past the pig farm (now gone). Sylvia in my class didn't like school dinners, so took a paper bag to school; she would fill it with the bits she wouldn't eat, stuff it up her knickers, and lob it over to the pigs on the walk back.

Our school life was intimately tied up with the church. We read from the Bible before lessons every day and were taken to services that fell on weekdays, like Ash Wednesday. We learnt many psalms by heart, my favourite being 'I will lift up mine eves unto the hills' because our lives were surrounded by the vast and numinous Surrey Hills. The rector then was Mr Cornell, and this was one of the sermons he delivered to the school. He told us that in Greek, the word for 'soul' was the same as the word for 'butterfly'. He said the butterfly was a metaphor for the soul, 'Do you know what a metaphor is, children?' and that one day our souls would emerge from their chrysalises as glorious as butterflies. We understood about the life cycle of the butterfly, as Mr Webb was a keen naturalist, and taught us a great deal about butterflies, natterjack toads and monkey orchids, but apart from that, we didn't understand much. I did, however, remember the sermon, and discovered later in life what a metaphor was, and that Mr Cornell was quite correct in his Greek.

Apart from psalms, services and sermons, the church provided the school with a splendid Christmas party in the village hall, with a large Christmas tree from which every child received a surprise and welcome gift. The world then was still consciously suffering post-war privations. There was rationing, and little money to spend. The boys chanted 'We won the War/In Nineteen Forty-Four' in the playground, while the girls did their skipping games under the apple trees. One day we all went out to watch a broken war plane being transported down the A24. We had very few materials for our sewing lessons until, to everyone's amazement, the school received a bale of cloth, pale green, smelling delicious, printed with pink roses. Miss James cried. I sewed an apron for my mother.

The village hall was also the scene of the annual Church Fete (at which my few inches of knitting won 3rd Prize), and other memorable events. Once, standing in the hall, Mr Webb saw the huge oak tree outside sinking before his very eyes. He watched the whole tree sink into the ground. I have a memory (?) of seeing the top branches of the oak way below our feet, in its hollow, Mr. Webb used the occasion to tell us the ancient story about swallow holes, and chalk streams and the River Mole. When I visited old haunts yesterday, I was told a few more sink holes had appeared in the grounds of RGS Surrey Hills.

I visited St. Michael's again, saw the photograph of the Reverend Cornell, exactly as I remembered him, and memorials to Brigadier Schreiber and Judge Lloyd Jacobs, who featured in our lives so long ago. The ragged banners that hung over the chancel were no longer there, and I could not find the brass I rubbed when I returned as a teenager, Lady Jane Iwarby, as I remember. I also visited my school, in many ways much as I remembered it. though greatly expanded, with large bright rooms, brilliant wall displays and a library (unthought of when I was little). The children are now aged only 4 to 7, and the teachers (as kind as those when I was young) said sadly they wished there were more. Children are no longer collected from Box Hill by bus. Still, the ones who were there looked as happy as we had been, rushing around the brightly painted but unchanged playground. Meridel Holland

We have thirty-three people on the delivery team. All of them play a vital role in delivering this magazine to the church and other institutions and over five hundred homes in the villages of Mickleham and Westhumble and in between.

The team works with one person receiving all the magazines, then bagging up the correct number of magazines for each individual deliverer. Three people pick up about a third of these bags each and deliver one to the individual deliverer's door. The individual deliverer then hands out all their bagful usually to neighbours along their road. A couple of rounds are more scattered. On that note, I am delighted to welcome Lynn Papworth to the team who is going to take on Swanworth Lane west round, one of

Most of you are probably unaware of this carefully choreographed system to get the magazine to you free of charge. It works incredibly well most of the time thanks to the deliverers' commitment and reliability. We usually suggest that each person finds a substitute, so that if they cannot do their round one month, we have someone ready to step in. If there is no substitute, Charlotte or I act as back up and do the deliveries. We would prefer not to have to do this too often on top of editing.

The rounds lacking back-up are listed below. Rounds cover 5 to 35 magazines depending on houses in a road, so usually take under an hour to post. The main deliverer commits to ten issues a year (no January and August issue), so

your commitment would be less than that. You would be sent a timetable so that you know in advance when the delivery weekends fall but it is usually the last weekend of the month.


